

Endowed Love is Forever Love

Until 2010, fundraising was about survival for the Cancer Council of Reno County. Solely focused on meeting the annual needs of patients fighting cancer, the Council's leadership thought putting money away in an endowed fund seemed out of the question. With inspiration from donors, board members, and Hutchinson Community Foundation, the Cancer Council began making a conscious effort to create a fund, with hopes of a more sustainable future.

"We had to expand our thinking from helping cancer patients today, to helping cancer patients forever," said Sandy Woodson, Executive Director of CCRC.

Endowed funds serve as an organization's long-term savings account, where the principal remains untouched, and the organization only spends the interest into perpetuity. CCRC works to build the fund through their annual Round-Up fundraiser, the Community Foundation's Match Day events, and through special gifts. The board even committed \$10,000 from operating funds to the endowment in honor of CCRC's first director, Mary Hall.

Charlie and Sharon have been longtime Donor Advised Fund holders and community philanthropists. As a mom and teacher, Sharon has always loved helping children learn and thrive, so it's not surprising that she supports early childhood initiatives, along with Grace Episcopal Church, through her Endowed Legacy Fund.

The Kimbell and Almanza families have chosen to honor the community that helped shape them by making gifts through the Hutchinson Community Foundation. The impact of their philanthropic spirits will be felt in Hutchinson for generations to come.

Love Through Placemaking

Since the first splash park opened in Avenue A Park, Rhonda Hiebert has been a champion for one in Rice Park in northwest Hutchinson—near the Montessori Learning Center, where she serves as director.

In 2015, she brought this idea to Hutchinson Community Foundation's Envision Hutch Unconference, and several other community members joined the effort to move the cause forward. Their first step was a family carnival in Rice Park, where they asked families to sign a petition voicing support of the idea.

With the idea for a new splash pad gaining momentum, Hutchinson Community Foundation helped gather interested parties and soon had a financial commitment from the City, as well as donations from community members, including Mert Sellers, a long-time advocate for free family activities in Hutchinson.

"At the ribbon cutting ceremony, a young girl thanked me for the splash pad, saying she was excited to be able to ride her bike and play on a hot day," said Aubrey Abbott Patterson, Foundation President & CEO. "That's why we do what we do."

WHAT IS PLACEMAKING?

Placemaking inspires people to work together to reimagine public spaces as the heart of a community. This work seeks to strengthen the connection between the people in a community and the spaces and places they share.

ENERGY AROUND EARLY CHILDHOOD



Brad and Valerie Pryor first realized the need for more high-quality, affordable childcare in Reno County when they were in need of it themselves. As they began looking at childcare options for their young children, they experienced frustration with wait lists and knew they couldn't be alone.

"We say we want young families to live here, but we were lacking some of the services they need," said Brad.

Looking for solutions, the Pryors gathered key community stakeholders—Hutchinson Community Foundation, the Hutchinson/Reno County Chamber of Commerce, and the United Way of Reno County— for a conversation around early childhood programs in Reno County.

"Even people without kids or grandkids in the area got involved because they love Hutchinson and felt it was the right thing to do," said Valerie.

They began connecting others who were looking to make progress, and as a result, a new childcare facility opened in early June at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church.

"The progress made is great, but we need to keep the ball rolling. I want all kids to start kindergarten from the same starting block, and that requires quality early childhood programming," said Brad.

RELIEF FOR WILDFIRE VICTIMS

When wildfires erupted in Reno County in early March, Lucas Soltow's home was in the evacuation zone. He wanted information, and he saw a communications gap. Roads were closed, evacuation areas were changing, and he knew people would need information to feel reassured during a frightening time.

Soltow formed a Facebook group, which gave those in the area a common place to share information related to the fires. Many in the group were asking how they could help fire victims, and through a partnership with Reno County Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD), he spearheaded dontations to a relief fund at Hutchinson Community Foundation.



Through Soltow's promotional and collaborative efforts, the Disaster Recovery Fund generated nearly \$16,000, not including the other ways people could give through the United Way of Reno County and 211.

"The outpouring of concern and interest in helping others was amazing. Now more people know about VOAD and might be inclined to donate to the organization's fund in times of disaster," said Soltow.

HEALTHY FOOD AND COMMUNITY



The Arlington Farm and Art Market was formed to bring fresh produce, baked goods, arts & crafts, live music, and a children's story time to Arlington. Kelsi Depew, the market's coordinator, said she was delighted when she realized it also gave the people of Arlington a place to build community.

"We've made a choice to create culture rather than just consume culture," said Depew. "Bringing people from the area together here in Arlington has been so meaningful. My kids have a sense of family right here in our community."

Those interested in shopping at the market or just soaking up its vibe can join in the fun every Thursday evening from 4:00-7:00 p.m., June through September.

Depew is active in Heal Reno County, serving on the Food Policy Council and Healthy Foods Work Group. Her work in Arlington has also been awarded two grants from the Coumminity Foundation: one for improved access to the community center and the other to fund a community clean-up project.

FAITH THROUGH PHILANTHROPY

Looking for a way to show love and support for their community, Phil Auxier and the church he pastors, Crestview Bible Church, used their location along the trail system in Northwest Hutchinson to their advantage.

After a discussion with the Vitality Team of Reno County, the idea for a bicycle repair station was born. The church began collaborating with area agencies on the project. The City of Hutchinson's Parks Department offered expertise, and the Friends of the Trail Fund became a funding partner. The church also contributed money from the memorial fund of church member and longtime Parks Department employee, David Gaeddert.



Phase one of the project involved installing a bench and bicycle repair equipment. Phase two, made possible by a Make It Greater Grant from Hutchinson Community Foundation, will add a drinking fountain at the site.

Crestview Bible Church celebrates with all the partners who came together to help with the project, and the the church will continue to provide maintenance and upkeep for the station.






